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Blue Poppy

The poetry of **Blue Poppy** looks hard and uncompromisingly at human beings caught up in difficult, painful realities. Yet there is always an undertone of irony, a fleeting touch of beauty, poignant and fragile, in the face of an implacable world. Ilona Martonfi's stark, bare-bones style has a subtle power: it juxtaposes series of images, either grey with destitution or coloured with energy, and lets the reader make the connections and absorb the resonance. Her poems are eyes, haunted with feeling, that do not look away.
